## 1. Background

Peninsula Brookfield Trustee Private Limited ('the Company') was incorporated on 21 November 2011 with the objective of acting as a trustee to Peninsula Brookfield India Real Estate Fund (the 'Fund'). The Company is domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act applicable in India. The principal shareholders of the Company are Peninsula Holdings and Investments Private Limited and Brookfield Capital Partners (Bermuda) Limited.

## 2. Basis of preparation

#### 2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis (refer note 19) in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), under the historical cost convention the accrual basis except for certain financial instrument which are measured at fair value, the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the 'Act') (to the extent notified) and prescribed under Section 133 of Act and relevant amendment rules issued thereafter. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly-issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The Company is a Small company as defined under section 2(85) of the Companies Act, 2013. Accordingly, the Company has not prepared cash flow statement by virtue of section 2(40) read with section 2(85) of the Companies Act, 2013.

#### 2.2 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR), which is also the Company's functional currency. All amounts have been rounded-off to the nearest rupees, unless otherwise indicated.

# 2.3 Current /Non-current classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/ non-current classification.

An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in it's normal operating cycle;
- b) Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- c) Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- d) Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current.

#### 2.3. Current /Non-current classification (Continued)

A liability is current when:

- a) It is expected to be settled in it's normal operating cycle;
- b) It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- c) It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- d) There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities, if applicable are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents. The Company has identified twelve months as its operating cycle.

#### 2.4 Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, except for the certain financial instruments which are measured at fair value.

#### 2.5 Use of estimates and judgements

In preparing these financial statements, management has made judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised prospectively.

#### 2.6 Provisions and contingent liabilities

A provision is recognised when the Company has a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions (excluding retirement benefits) are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the Balance Sheet date. These are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed in the notes. Contingent liabilities are disclosed for

- (1) possible obligations which will be confirmed only by future events not wholly within the control of the Company or
- (2) present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made.

#### 2.7 Revenue

Trusteeship fees is recognized on accrual basis, in accordance with the trusteeship agreement entered into with the Fund. The Company has stopped charging trusteeship fee from 24 August 2019.

Interest income is recognised on accrual basis using the effective interest method.

#### 2.8 Income tax

Income tax comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in statement of profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity or in other comprehensive income

#### Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. The amount of current tax reflects the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received after considering the uncertainty, if any, related to income taxes. It is measured using tax rates (and tax laws) enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset only if there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts, and it is intended to realise the asset and settle the liability on a net basis or simultaneously.

#### Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax is also recognised in respect of carried forward tax losses and tax credits.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which they can be used. Company recognises a deferred tax asset only to the extent that it has sufficient taxable temporary differences or there is convincing other evidence that sufficient taxable profit will be available against which such deferred tax asset can be realised. Deferred tax assets — unrecognised or recognised, are reviewed at each reporting date and are recognised/ reduced to the extent that it is probable/ no longer probable respectively that the related tax benefit will be realised.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. The measurement of deferred tax reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity, or on different tax entities, but they intend to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis or their tax assets and liabilities will be realised simultaneously.

#### 2.9 Trade receivable and trade payable

Trade receivable represents the amount due on the services rendered in the normal course of business and trade payable represents the amount due on account of services received in the normal course of business.

For trade receivables only, the Company applies the simplified approach permitted by Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables.

#### 2.10 Recent accounting pronouncements

On 24 March 2021, the Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") through a notification, amended Schedule III of the Act. The amendments revise Division I, II and III of Schedule III and are applicable from 1 April 2021. Key amendments relating to Division II which relate to companies whose financial statements are required to comply with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules 2015 are:

#### Balance Sheet:

- Certain additional disclosures in the statement of changes in equity such as changes in equity share capital due to prior period errors and restated balances at the beginning of the current reporting period.
- Specified format for disclosure of shareholding of promoters.
- Specified format for ageing schedule of trade receivables, trade payables, capital work-inprogress and intangible asset under development.
- If a company has not used funds for the specific purpose for which it was borrowed from banks and financial institutions, then disclosure of details of where it has been used.
- Specific disclosure under 'additional regulatory requirement' such as compliance with approved schemes of arrangements, compliance with number of layers of companies, title deeds of immovable property not held in name of company, loans and advances to promoters, directors, key managerial personnel (KMP) and related parties, details of benami property held etc.

#### Statement of profit and loss:

Additional disclosures relating to Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR), undisclosed income and
crypto or virtual currency specified under the head 'additional information' in the notes forming part

The amendments are extensive, and the Company will evaluate the same to give effect to them as required by law.

#### 14 Capital management

The Company's policy is to maintain a strong capital base to sustain future development of the business. The Company has adequate cash and bank balances and continues to remain debt-free. The Company monitors its capital by a careful scrutiny of the cash and bank balances, and a regular assessment of any debt requirements. #### 15 Financial instruments – Fair values and risk management

#### i. Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivables from customers and investment securities. Credit risk is managed through monitoring the creditworthiness of customers to which the Company grants credit terms in the normal course of business. The Company establishes an allowance for doubtful debts and impairment that represents its estimate of incurred losses in respect of trade and other receivables and investments, to the extent applicable.

#### Trade receivables

The Company's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the individual characteristics of each customer. However, management also considers the factors that may influence the credit risk of its customer base, including the default risk of the industry and country in which customers operate.

There are no trade receivables as at 31 March 2021 and 31 March 2020 hence, disclosure as per para 34(a) of Ind AS 107 is not provided.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

The Company held cash and cash equivalents of INR 14,23,254 at 31 March 2021 (31 March 2020: INR 14,28,454). The cash and cash equivalents are held with bank and financial institution counterparties with good credit ratings.

#### ii. Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when they are due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Company's reputation.

Management monitors rolling forecasts of the Company's liquidity position on the basis of expected cash flows. This monitoring includes financial ratios and takes into account the accessibility of cash and cash equivalents.

#### Exposure to liquidity risk

#### iii. Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk can be either fair value interest rate risk or cash flow interest rate risk. # 19. Going concern and COVID-19 impact

The Company presently does not earn any revenue from the existing trusteeship contract. While the Company does not have any other revenue arrangement, the management is presently exploring various opportunities for new trusteeship contracts and is confident of identifying and executing fresh contracts. Further, the Company has sufficient cash and bank balances to meet the liabilities outstanding as of 31 March 2021 and its expenses for next financial year.

The Company has evaluated impact of COVID-19 pandemic on its business operations and financial position and based on the same, no significant impacts on the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2021 were identified. However, the extent to which the COVID-19 pandemic will impact the Company's business and future business plans at this time is dependent on future developments.

The management has a reasonable expectation that the Company will be able to meet all its contractual obligations and liabilities as they fall due in near future and that the Company will be able to procure new trusteeship contracts for carrying on its operations. Accordingly, the financial statements of the Company are prepared on a going concern basis.

# 20. SEBI Inspection

During the year ended 31 March 2021, SEBI has issued a Show Cause Notice basis inspection of our books of accounts and other records of the Company. The matters raised include drawdown of contributions less than INR 1 crore from investors, extension of the tenure of the Fund etc. These matters were initially raised vide an Inspection Report followed up by an Administrative Warning Letter and now have been raised through a Show Cause Notice. The Company is one of the recipients of the Show Cause Notice (those who have received include the Investment Manager, Directors of the Investment Manager etc.) The Show Cause Notice stipulates to holding of an inquiry for the alleged non-compliances and imposing a penalty as per the procedure laid down in SEBI (Procedure for holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 read with SEBI Act and provides a time limit of 14 days to file a reply. We have applied for physical inspection of the documents and asked for further period of 3 weeks to reply after inspection of documents, reply for which is pending from SEBI. Further the company has already applied for settlement. We are uncertain of settlement amount which will be levied by SEBI. In case of shortfall, both the sponsors shall contribute equally towards the liability in terms of clause 15.3.2 of Joint Venture Agreement dated 15 December 2011.

#### 21. Subsequent events

The Company has evaluated subsequent events, as defined under IND AS 10 "Events after the reporting period" through 11 June 2021 and no material subsequent event have been identified.
